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Information Search Worksheet

1. Your research question

What are the key words and phrases in your research question? Write your question below, then **circle** the important words or phrases and cross out other words:

Example: Should Wikipedia be used as a source of information?

Circle important words or phrases that best describes your topic

Avoid using vague or non-descriptive words like the, it, in, used, at.

2. Transforming keywords into a search statement

Connect your keywords or phrases with AND

3. Test your search statement

4. Your results: too much information?

Did you get too many search results? Your topic may be too broad and needs to be narrowed.

You may want to break your topic down by population, issue, and/or location:

Examples of populations	Examples of issues	Examples of locations
• children	• education	• United States
• adults	• racism	• Asia
• elderly	• sports	• New York City
• African American	• technology	• Los Angeles
• women		• Midwest

Add a subtopic to your search like the ones listed above using AND

Example: Wikipedia AND source AND information AND education

5. Your results: too little information?

Did you get too few or no search results?

Option 1: Check your spelling.

Misspelled words may be the reason for too few results. Try http://www.dictionary.com

Option 2: Search for alternative word endings (**truncation**).

To search for various word endings, put an asterisk (*) at the end of the word root

Example: inform* will retrieve information, informed, informative, etc.

Option 3: Search similar or related words (synonyms) by placing **OR** between the words.

 Connecting the synonyms with OR will broaden your search by returning results in which anyof the words appear.

Example: information OR research OR data
